## **Course Description**

An introduction to the principles and methods of biblical interpretation.

## Learning Objectives:

By the end of this course the student should

- 1. Understand the nature of Scripture, along with the concepts of canon, inspiration, inerrancy, as well as the process of receiving the text and translations
- 2. Understand the frameworks of progressive revelation, biblical reasoning, and the history of interpretation
- 3. Know how to identify the different types of writing in Scripture as well as develop the skills needed to interpret each one
- 4. Have grown in reverence for God and his Word so as to hold firm to his trustworthy Word as taught in order to rightly handle his Word in teaching with instruction and correcting (Titus 1:9, II Timothy 2:15)
